## GRADE WEIGHTING AND CLASS RANK

**CLASS RANK & GRADE POINT AVERAGE Class Rank in District 186 High Schools is determined by computing a weighted grade-point average.**

The weighted GPA is determined by multiplying the Weight (**W**) of the course and the numerical Value (**V**) of the student's earned grade (A=5, B=4, C=3, D=2, F=0) and dividing the SUM of the products by the total number of semester courses taken or semester classes Attempted (**A**). The resulting number (GPA) is divided by 5 to attain the Weighted Grade Point Average (**WGPA**).

**SUM (W x V) / 5 = WGPA** (Weighted 4 point scale)

## CREDIT SYSTEM

The school year is divided into two 18-week semesters. Unless otherwise indicated, each semester course receives .50 Carnegie Units. Twenty-Six Carnegie Units are required for graduation for the class of 2014. One Carnegie Unit equals 36 weeks per year, 5 periods per week, and 50 minutes per day. The district 186 grading policy utilizes a 10-point grading scale, and it is used in all classes. For example, 90 – 100 = an A.

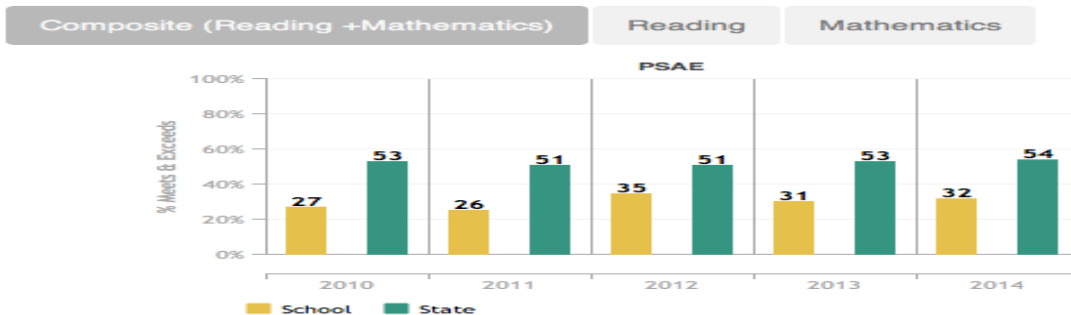

## COMMUNITY

Springfield, Illinois – located one hundred miles north of St. Louis, Missouri – is internationally famous as the home of Abraham Lincoln. The capital of Illinois is enriched by a variety of cultural, educational, and recreational facilities, including a community theatre, symphony orchestra, municipal opera, and art association. ## SCHOOL

Lanphier High School is one of three public, four-year comprehensive secondary schools in Springfield with an enrollment of 1,200 students from a community of approximately 116,000. The school was designated as an Illinois Historical Site in March of 2007, and it hosts the Ethel Furlich chapter of the National Honor Society. The school library houses approximately 15,500 catalogued books, and the library serves as a technology resource including a computer lab, which is available for student access during the day and after school during after-school tutoring.

## CURRICULUM

Lanphier High School offers a comprehensive curriculum, a summer school program, advanced placement opportunities, dual credit courses and special education services. Extensive vocational programs are offered through a partnership with Capital Area Career Center.
